What is LIVTENCITY?

LIVTENCITY is a prescription medicine used to treat cytomegalovirus (CMV) infection and disease in adults and children 12 years of age and older weighing at least 77 pounds (35 kg) who have received a transplant, when their infection or disease does not respond to treatment with the medicines ganciclovir, valganciclovir, cidofovir or foscarnet. It is not known if LIVTENCITY is safe and effective in children under 12 years of age.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

Before taking LIVTENCITY, tell your healthcare provider about all your medical conditions, including if you:

- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if LIVTENCITY will harm your unborn baby.
- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. It is not known if LIVTENCITY passes
 into your breast milk. Talk to your healthcare provider about the best way to
 feed your baby during treatment with LIVTENCITY.

Before you start

Let your transplant team know you have a certain number of questions so they can leave time to address your concerns thoroughly.





Questions about cytomegalovirus (CMV):

How did I get CMV?

Will I always have CMV?

What will the risk be to my health?

What symptoms should I look for? When do I let you know?

Will I need any new tests? If so, what are they and how often will I need them?

I have been told that my CMV is **refractory**. What does this mean?

I have been told that my CMV is resistant. What does this mean?

Do I need to do anything differently to protect my loved ones from infection?

How do I talk to my friends or family about what I am going through?

Your Care Plan

How often will I need to have appointments now that I have active CMV?

How long will I take medicines for CMV?

Why am I changing medications?

Not all of these questions will apply to your situation, and **you may think of other questions you may want to ask.**

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION (con't)

Tell your healthcare provider about all of the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins and herbal supplements. LIVTENCITY may affect the way other medicines work, and other medicines may affect how LIVTENCITY works and cause serious side effects.

• Do not start a new medicine without telling your healthcare provider. Your healthcare provider will tell you if it is safe to take LIVTENCITY with other medicines.



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What are the possible side effects of LIVTENCITY?

The most common side effects of LIVTENCITY include:

- · changes in taste
- nausea
- diarrhea
- vomiting
- tiredness

These are not all the possible side effects of LIVTENCITY.
